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## JAYNE FAMILY HISTORY

1.

In attempting to write this sketchy record and history of the JAYNE family of Setauket, L.I., I am endeavoring to make it somewhat different than a list of names lacking blood, bone and muscle. Perhaps what I am trying to say can be best expressed in the words of a little five year old boy who once came to me with a dead bug in his hand and asked, "Can you make this dead bug come alive?" What I am trying to do is make these early ancestors of ours come alive again in the consciousness of the readers of this generation, so that they may feel that they are but a link in a very long chain of human beings by the name of JAYNE, going back three hundred years in America. And it is hoped the readers will allow their imaginations to go back to their royal ancestry of England, Scotland, Ireland, France and Wales. Perhaps the thought will arise, "Well, these old fellows were probably scoundrels and crooks." And again the thought may perhaps arise, "What will be said about the present generation three hundred years from now?" At least these royal ancestors had the best advantages of their time for education, social standing, manners and behavior, and none can say they were cowards. They were the writers of the Magna Carta, and include such names as Charlemagne, whose ancestry goes back to Anator, King of the Cimmericians D.C. 443; Alfred the Great, King of England; Richard the Lion-hearted; William the Conqueror 1027-1087; King Edward of England 1239-1307. All these are found in the WOODHULL and HORNUM Magna Carta ancestry. It is apparent that the immigrant, WILLIAM JAYNE had royal ancestry.

May I be excused if I seem personal in my approach to this history. My interest in family history began around the age of fifteen when my mother, Eva JAYNE Dull received a number of letters from B.G. (Benajah Gustin) JAYNE of Lone Tree, Iowa, I am including a number of ~~the~~ letters in this record. It must have been a great disappointment to him not to have been able to publish his record, the work of almost a lifetime; and it is WORK. My Uncle John Marklin JAYNE met him once in Idaho and had a long conversation with him. He ten was old, feeble and ill, but mentally very active and alert, so I take pleasure in including copies of his letters which have been sent to me to use in this record.

In order to understand and appreciate one's early ancestry, it would seem necessary to know something about the land and locality where they settled at that time, how they lived, and what changes took place within that section of the country within the first hundred years or so.

This record is primarily about Long Island and that region where our immigrant ancestor, William JAYNE I, made his home, which was at Setauket and Brookhaven Township, in the County of Suffolk, L.I. Here are found such well-known villages as Southampton, probably founded around 1640 and Southold, founded about the same date. On the north shore is Shelter Island, and at the extreme north end was Riverside and Riverhead. Riverhead was an outgrowth of Southold and was started around 1792. In approximately 1639 a party of settlers from New England located on Long Island.

Shortly, thereafter, some fifty old male immigrants came from Boston and vicinity, most of them of high caliber, well educated

and of independent spirit. The first settlement was located several miles from Long Island Sound at what is now "The Village Green."

It was at Setauket, L.I. that our ancestor, William JAYNE I (born de Jeanne) came in 1668 from New Haven, Connecticut. He had come here from Bristol, England. It is said that he had an uncle, William James (de Jeanne) living in New Haven at the time. This William James claimed the same ancestry as our William JAYNE I immigrant. He afterwards changed his name to "James" and was said to have been the first town clerk of New Haven. A record of this family was found in the New York City Library, where the writer claimed de Jeanne ancestry. (B.G. JAYNE mentions him in his letters as our William JAYNE's uncle.)

The name JAYNE appears to be of Norman ancestry derived from the name de Jeanne which is found in English records. This ancestry is not traced beyond Henry de Jeanne, who was a graduate of Oxford Uni University and a lecturer there on Theology. While there a son was born on January 25, 1616. He was christened fifteen days later, William de Jeanne. This William is said to have lived at Hlavelion on the east coast of Wales, where he lived for about 12 years after the restoration. Owing to religious persecution, he changed his name and fled to America about the year 1668. He was then a widower with grown sons in England. He was a chaplain in Cromwell's Army, but was a cooper by trade, which was the making of barrels and casks, a very important trade in those days. Every ship that came to America in colonial days had to have a cooper on board.

Mr. Eben H. Jayne, a lawyer in Chicago, Illinois, states in a letter which will be included in this record that the JAYNE origin was of Norman or Celtic-Welsh ancestry. It was claimed through the celebrated Sir William ap Thomas Herbert, Knight of Reglan, who was a direct heir of a certain Herbert, Chamberlain of Henry I and continuing through 9 generations of his ancestry.

Henry de Jaanne traced his ancestry to Guido de Jeanne, a famous general in the service of the French Confederation, who was detailed to escort Henry II of England and place him on the throne. He was knighted by Henry and given the Manor of Kirklings in Cambridgeshire, England. There is a JAYNE coat of arms, which has been claimed by members of the JAYNE family.

Following are the records of Edward H. JAYNE on the JAYNE family military service:

William JAYNE, eldest son of James JAYNE of Smithtown, L.I., great grandfather of Edward H. Jayne of Mt. Vernon N.Y., served as a private in Colonel Keltius' Battalion. This battalion was recruited from Northampton Co., Penna.; Orange Co., N.Y.; and Suffolk Co., L.I. N.Y. by Captain Timothy JAYNE, who was born on L.I. at Setauket in 1741. His father William JAYNE 3rd moved to Northampton Co. Penna. with his five sons, all of whom served in the Revolution. Their names were Timothy, John, David, Isaac, Ebenezer and the eldest son, William (4) who served from L.I. and was killed in the Battle of Long Island Aug. 26 to Aug. 27, 1776. His son, William (5), also lost his life in this battle.

This battalion belonged to the Earl's Flying Camp which consisted of ten thousand men, being authorized by the Continental Congress and organized on July 27, 1775, at Brunswick, Penna. Shortly afterwards this battalion and other militia of Penna. and Long Island took part in the Battle of Long Island. This entire Militia Battalion was captured by the British and the troops were all placed on prison ships at Wallabout Bay, Brooklyn, N.Y. The officers were exchanged in Dec. 1776, but the privates nearly all died from cruel treatment and starvation with the exception of William JAYNE and his cousin Samuel JAYNE who were paroled Sept. 1, 1778

In 1675 William JAYNE I immigrant, in company with 10 others, crossed Long Island Sound and purchased what is now Brookhaven. (In New York we have towns as a sub-division of a county. In Penna. it is a township. Brookhaven runs from the Sound to the ocean and is 22 miles lengthwise of the island.) Under a regulation of the Crown, the Indian title had to be extinguished before a grant from the Crown would be made. Having made their purchase from the Indians, they made application for a grant from the Crown. The purchasers' names on the Brookhaven deed from the Nassau Indians, run in the same order as the names in the town grant from the Crown--Nathaniel Brewster, Nathaniel Woodhull, William JAYNE, Ebenezer Hulse--

This Crown grant was completed in 1678 and allotments made to the grantees according to the New England System. Upon the organization of the town in 1678, William JAYNE (1) was made one of the trustees of the town and so remained until 1709 when his son, William JAYNE (2) succeeded him as trustee and his second son, John (2) was elected constable and collector. Demaiah (D.G.) JAYNE states that he had made copies of these duly recorded records in the town of Brookhaven as all of these records are still extant. (about 1900) This grant of land and records would make it possible for descendants to belong to the Society of Colonial Dames. D.G. JAYNE states that he has copies of old deeds from 1710 and many old wills and reproductions of the more prominent members of the family.

When William JAYNE (1) died at Setauket, L.I. in the year 1714, he left behind 6 sons and 2 daughters. These 6 sons had 21 sons. These 21 sons had over 60 sons at the time of the Revolution. The New York State Records show the following men:

Jonathan Jayne, enlisted May 5th 1776, 4th Co. N.Y. Regiment. (It is believed that Jonathan was a son of Isaac Jayne born 1715 and married Mary Jones.) Jotham Jayne born in Smithtown, L.I. Mar. 4, 1758, died Mar. 14, 1819. Jotham Jayne settled on a government grant of land at Kellogsville, N.Y. which land is still owned by his descendants, Lawrence M. JAYNE and sons. It is known as Century Farm at Kellogsville and is located near Coravia, N.Y. Elijah JAYNE, Lieutenant, 2nd Light Dragoons, Lansingburgh, N.Y. (I do not know who his parents were.) Benjamin JAYNE of Cap. Phineas Rumsow's Company. (He was probably a son of Isaac JAYNE and Mary Jones Jayne of South Haven.

Besides this, the Penna. Archives of the Revolution show that Captain Timothy JAYNE was sent on a recruiting trip in 1776 to get

enlistments for a force of 10,000 men, to be known as Hart's Flying Camp. It was composed of men from different parts of the country and made up of separate battalions which were to be ready for any emergency. The men were from Suffolk and Orange Co., N.Y. and Northampton Co., Penna. From Orange Co., N.Y. came Captain John JAYNE, 2nd Reg N.Y., Lieutenant Daniel JAYNE and Nathaniel JAYNE. These 3 were brothers and the sons of John JAYNE (2) and Sarah Woodhull Jayne.

Benjamin, Jonathan and Stephen JAYNE, sons of Isaac JAYNE of Goshen, Orange Co., N.Y.

Samuel JAYNE, son of Robert JAYNE of Setauket. (He was probably the son of Stephen JAYNE (1), youngest son of William JAYNE (1) the immigrant.)

William JAYNE, son of James JAYNE of Smithtown, L.I. (He was probably the son of William JAYNE (2). James was born in 1698. His wife was Deborah-----

Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego JAYNE, sons of James and Deborah JAYNE of South Haven, L.I. James also had 3 other sons, Tinkerton, James and Cnno JAYNE. James JAYNE died at South Haven in 1781. He was not the James JAYNE who dies at Smithtown in 1736 and was the great great grandfather of Edward H. JAYNE, who with the help of B.G. JAYNE compiled a history of the JAYNE and Smack Families of N.Y.

Not all of the JAYNE men who served in the Revolution are listed here and many records were destroyed, mostly by fire. No doubts some records were not well documented. The records for the 3 sons of John JAYNE and Sarah Woodhull Jayne might be found in records of Orange Co., N.Y. The record for Samuel JAYNE who married Dinah Tooker, might also be found there.

Some few years ago, Mr. Howard C. Sherwood purchased the old JAYNE homestead at Setauket, L.I. from the Jayne families who had lived in this home for generations, probably up to the time of 1908. It is located in Snarling Hollow on Snarl Hollow Road, Setauket, L.I. now know as the Old Coach Road as per Mr. Sherwood, the present owner.

Excerpt from "Refugees from Long Island to Connecticut during the Revolution," Norwalk, Conn. Pub. Lib. by Mather Frederick Gregory;

The Americans had small chance of securing enough military prisoners to off set the large numbers taken after the Battle of Long Island and in disasters in the Highlands of the Hudson River in the fall of 1777.

Favorite points to attack were Setauket and Huntington, L.I.

From the New York Gazette, July 17, 1780: " We hear from Setauket, L.I. that last Friday night a party of rebels surrounded the house of Dr. Punderson, took him prisoner and carried him into Conn. and on that same night they took Mr. William JAYNE Jr. The rebels told Mrs. Punderson that they took Mr. Punderson to exchange for John Smith, and Mr. JAYNE to exchange for William Phillips, who were taken at Smithtown at the Widow Mydenburgh's on a Trading Party." The refugees were on the American side and were not Tories. There

were many claims against N.Y. State for the expense of removal to Conn. after the Battle of Long Island. I found very little had been written about these unfortunate people, Missin 7 years exile to Conn. rivals in pathos that of the French Acadians. The following names were found in the volume mentioned above:

There were Horton names as well as Norton; Nathan Woodhull, 1st Major of Brookhaven, Suffolk Co., Militia, 1st or 2nd Regiment; Caleb Woodhull, 1st lieu, Suffolk Co.; 1st Lieu, Abraham Woodhull, Huntington Co.; from Brookhaven came Esiga Benjamin Woodhull; Capt. William Brewster; Nathaniel Brewster of Smithtown Co.; Robert JAYNE and Shadrach JAYNE, enlisted men; George Norton; Capt. Bestwick; Col. C. Webb, 19th Continental, crossed the Delaware at Trenton Dec. 25, 1776; Nathaniel Horton lost a gun in Arnold's detachment Quebec 1775.

The prisoners were kept on cattle ships of which the "Jersey" was the most notorious. The mortality was heavy. As many as 15,000 died, mostly from starvation. In 1808 their bones were buried in Brooklyn, N.Y. In June 1900 bones from the Navy Yard were buried in Fort Green Park in the Martyr's Tomb.

The book, "Refugees of 1776 from Long Island to Conn." Ap. G (-1-42-) contains a complete record of militia from Kings, Queens and Suffolk, the three counties comprising the territory of Long Island. Following are a few of the names:

Of great value and importance in the early days of settlers in Long Island were the village blacksmiths. Men who made and kept in repair the hardware for the homes, hinges, locks and bars, as well as the farming tools, were much in demand. The ordinary farm produced food, fuel and clothing. Farmers shipped surpluses to market from the nearest landing, as the ocean was the highway from Long Island to New York and New England. So the Long Island farmer had a small income and enjoyed a better life than those struggling in the back country or on frontiers. Some of the immigrants brought a degree of wealth with them from England and their homelands. With cheese, butter and lard and possibly, leather and hides, people were able to pay their creditors. Hides were tanned and leather was made for the shoemaker to make shoes. Children at that time wore out shoes quickly, although they were undoubtedly made of more durable material than at the present time. The price was usually 12 shillings. Cleaning and dyeing of materials, pressing, tenting, fulling, was the work of tailors, particularly for people of more wealth. Medical care did not seem to be a prominent expense among these hardy settlers. Often the men were doctors as well as ministers and lawyers, living as plain farm folk and undoubtedly many home remedies were used.

Many of the old wills show how the families lived, and what their earthly possessions were. A dearly beloved wife is bequeathed two beds and bedsteads with suitable furniture for the same of such as I have in my house and also a case of draws, six silver spoons, and six chairs, also six plates, two platters, three basins and six knives and forks, also two cows and calves. A daughter may get two silver spoons and a negro girl. Sometime the will gave a negro servant a choice as to who she would live with among the children of the deceased.

It may come as a surprise to learn that there were slaves on Long Island in the early days. They were probably bought at the slave market at the foot of Wall Street, N.Y.C., selling for 33 pounds. Many items of clothing were bought clothe these slaves. People took good care of them, seeing that they had medical care and adequate housing. Only the well-to-do families could afford slaves.

Long Island was a valuable prize of the Revolution. The inhabitants reportedly paid two thirds of the colonial taxes. The surrounding waters yielded shell fish of all kinds and quantities of fish. In exchange for British merchandise, the country people bartered hogs, calves, ham, lambs, poultry, smoked beef or whatever they had on hand. Smuggling flourished along the Sound. Many men were willing to engage in illicit or London trade, but they were also willing to act as guides for American robbing parties. Perhaps much of the hardship was caused by the warfare between the Tories and the Rebels on Long Island itself, to which was added the attacks of the British army. This resulted in many people fleeing from L.I. to Conn., so well described in the book, "Refugees from L.I. to Conn." by Gregory. It was there that they suffered much misery, having lost their possessions on L.I. and having to do with little in Conn.

Those who were in more comfortable circumstances could purchase such articles as buttons, pins, hooks and eyes, needles, knitting needles, trimmings, laces, thread and button-hole twist, linen for sheets and tablecloths. Some of the material for dresses were bombazine, a twilled or corded fabric of silk; worsted Mode, a thin glossy material; peeling, a thin fabric; tiffany, a thin silk; satinette, an imitation of satin; dinity for curtains; tarmy, a fine worsted; durant, a woolen stuff, also known as everlasting; calico and chintz were among the materials used for the house and clothing.

Following are items found in an old Long Island will: To a wife is left the sum of 30 dollars a year, and the north room of my house with an adjoining bedroom, a privilege of the kitchen, cellar, and well, all the carpeting belonging to the said rooms, with the privilege of keeping two cows for her own use, as long as she remains my widow. To a son is left 1000 dollars as well as a feather bed, bedstead and change of furniture to said bed belonging, also the use of a room in my house, called the new room, also the privilege of keeping a horse winter and summer on my estate, also his board in the family he is to enjoy until the age of 21.

For other wills see the pamphlet, "The Jaynes Dealt in Land" by E. Kate W. Strong. This appeared in the Long Island Forum of Sept. 1897. Historical Society of Long Island.

Grain was ground at the mills for bread and cereals. There were five grades or boltings of wheat, first flour, second flour, canaille, middlings and bran. This bran made very good brown bread and mixed with Indian corn meal was used for pancakes, or cereal quickly cooked in boiling water. Eaten with cream and brown bread, this made a very good supper.

Churches were a very necessary part of the life of Long Islanders in the early days. There were two early churches on the green, the Presbyterian Church and the Caroline Episcopal Church built in 1729. Members of the JAYNE family are buried in both churchyards. William (1) the immigrant is buried in the Presbyterian Churchyard. This church was first built in 1714, but was struck by lightning and burned down in 1790 and rebuilt in 1811. Setauket Methodist Church built in 1870 located in E. Setauket.

Setauket Green was where the Presbyterian Church was built, and also the Caroline Episcopal Church as well as the old schoolhouse, which was later used as a library.

As there are no records of any amount of wealth among the JAYNE families, it may be assumed that they, too, suffered great hardships during the Revolution. Also probably there was much dissension and bitterness among the members of the family. Many of the 3rd generation were among the Rebels and it is known that many served in the War against the British, while their parents remained Loyalists. This must have caused much unhappiness and bitterness between parents and sons. A party of Rebels took William JAYNE (2) to Conn. to trade him for a captive of the British, one William Phillips. Whether the exchange was really made is not known, but William JAYNE (2) lived to raise a large family of sons and daughters. He was married to Elizabeth Woodhull.

The Revolutionary War caused a great deal of misery and financial losses to the people of Long Island. Seven of the military units that terrorized the people of Suffolk Co. were composed of Loyalists. They wore green uniforms and were composed of both horse and foot elements. The young men were enticed to join the Loyalists with offering of beautiful horses. They were also furnished with clothing, food and money sufficient to tempt them to join the army. Many of these Loyalists were from wealthy families. Some returned to England after the war and others scattered to different parts of the States and Canada. However, many members of the JAYNE family were Rebels, as can be seen by the number of JAYNE names in the records of the Revolution. Captain Timothy JAYNE, son of William JAYNE (3), had, in Col. Maltus' Battalion, which was recruited from Northampton Co., Penna., Orange Co. and Suffolk Co., N.Y., fifty-nine men by the name of JAYNE, of whom only 19 survived. Many records were lost or burned so there is no accurate account of how many JAYNE men served in the Revolution.

Caleb Drowster was one of the many sons of Setauket who had a distinguished record. He was born in 1747, a son of Benjamin Drowster. Benjamin Drowster was a great grandson of Rev. Nathaniel Drowster, the

first minister of the Setauket Presbyterian Church. Mention of Rev. Nathaniel Brewster is made because his son, Daniel Brewster, married Anna, the eldest daughter of William JAYNE (1). Anna JAYNE was born in 1676. There was no meeting house when Rev. Nathaniel Brewster arrived as pastor and he is supposed to have preached his first sermon on a large rock in front of the present church. Rev. Brewster was well qualified for his tasks at Setauket, having been graduated in the first class of Harvard in 1642 and is supposed to have been the first native American graduate in the New World. He is said to have been a good scholar, and his wife a woman noted in her day, for genius and literature. At a town meeting in 1669 a church building was first ordered. Nathaniel Horton, an ancestor of Tabitha Horton who married William JAYNE (3), was appointed to build the church 26 x 30 feet.

The second pastorate was that of Rev. George Phillips in the year 1702. He is said to have married Ann JAYNE, presumed to have been a sister of William JAYNE (1) immigrant. Rev. Phillips graduated from Harvard in 1686. These early Long Island churches represented the Puritan center from which American Presbyterianism grew. At the time that the Meeting House was occupied by the British, a raiding party under Col. Parsons and 150 rebels, attacked the church. They had come over from Black Rock, Conn. for this purpose. The damage to either side was slight. The Rebels sighted the British coming up the Sound in boats, so they left hurriedly and returned to the mainland. Among them was one by the name of Brewster and a Zachariah Green, a young man of 17, who, exactly 20 years later, was installed as pastor of this church. Cannon were mounted in the church and horses were stabled in it. The Brewsters all seem to have been related to Elder Brewster of Conn. and it is recorded that a female of that line, Ruth Brewster, married Ebenezer JAYNE, born Feb. 14, 1783, died Mar. 22, 1835, Ruth died Dec. 23, 1847. There will be a line of descent from the above Ebenezer JAYNE included in this record.

Evidence that the Setauket Presbyterian Church was a strongly established church is verified by a record of three hundred years. Since 1953 with a membership of 200, it has grown to 350 members. A Additions have been made and the church is active in the community.

Excerpts from the booklet, "Three Hundred Year History of the Setauket Presbyterian Church":

The details of the origin of the American spy system are vague. In 1776 Benjamin Tallmadge was its head, responsible to General Washington. The middleman in this system was Abraham Woodhull, a direct descendant of Richard Woodhull, one of the founders of the church. The man who so successfully navigated the Sound was Caleb Brewster, avowing brawling giant and a great grandson of Rev. Nathaniel Brewster. Caleb Brewster was seldom quiet and the British were generally the losers. He was lieutenant in the army. He carried messages from Abraham Woodhull in Setauket to Benjamin Tallmadge in Fairfield or Norwalk, Conn. Also with his lightly armed whale boats, he captured many supply vessels headed for the British army. He attacked British ships all over the Sound and in addition, led men in raids across Long Island, sometimes traveling 40 or 50 miles in a night, burning

and wrecking whatever belonged to the British.

Gen. Nathaniel Woodhull was one of the great patriots during the Revolution. He was the son of Nathaniel Woodhull and Sarah Smith Woodhull. He was also the descendant of Richard Woodhull(1), the first man by the name to live on Long Island. When his command was captured and he was taken prisoner, he surrendered his sword to a British officer who demanded that he say, "God save the King." "God save us all," was his reply. He was then beaten and thrown into prison where he later died. The Woodhull family were of royal descent and a Magna Charta line comes down through this family.

The only settler by the name of Woodhull that came to Long Island was Richard Woodhull. All others by the name of Woodhull must have descended from him.

#### Presbyterian Church at Setauket, L.I.

In the spring of 1665 a party of 6 pioneers from New England landed at what is now called Setauket. At that time all of the land in what is now Brookhaven Town was owned by two of thirteen tribes of Indians on Long Island, the Unkechhaugs and the Seatalcotts. It was with the chief of the Seatalcotts that these settlers made their agreement. Then began the work of platting lots and clearing the land. The number of persons who migrated from New England is not exactly known, but a list of those who comprised the settlement in 1657 is preserved. The names which are preserved number 55. Many of their descendants still dwell there at the present time. The exact date that a church was started is not known, but very early there were church services held in homes. Churches were not empty on Sunday in those days. A set of laws passed in 1665 was formed for punishment by fines, on anyone who neglected to attend public worship, up to ten shillings. For worse offenses or actions deemed profane, there was often a fine for as much as four shillings. Should a person refuse to pay, he was publicly whipped or put in the stocks. This punishment was general until the middle of the 18th century in Brookhaven Town.

The worshippers were well prepared for the religious services. The Holy day had begun the previous night. Food for Sunday had been prepared. Shoes had been shined. All work was to be avoided on Sunday. Saturday evening the family gathered together to read the Bible and other religious books that they may have owned. Services began with a prayer that lasted for a quarter of an hour or more. Then a chapter from the Bible was read and expounded upon. The singing was most impressive. Only the Psalms were used, being translated into meter for singing. There was no need for hymnals for these beautiful psalms were as much a part of the people as their knowledge of farming. No musical instruments, other than drums, which were used to call worshippers to service, were tolerated in the church. These Psalms were sung slowly and majestically to tunes their forefathers had brought from England and Scotland.

The second pastorate was filled by Rev. George Phillips, a graduate of Harvard in 1686 and installed as pastor in 1702. The town voted his: ten acres of land and later on another 200 acres were

voted for his use, to belong to him and his heirs forever, if he continued to serve all of his natural life.

NOTE: The compiler has a copy of a letter written by Eben H. JAYNE, a lawyer in Chicago, stating that he had a copy of a ship's log, where on were the names of Ann JAYNE and G. Phillips, and that Ann was the sister of the immigrant, William JAYNE (1). Eben JAYNE also states that land given to Rev. Phillips was signed by William JAYNE (2) a trustee of Brookhaven. (L.J.D.) In 1710 it was agreed that a meeting house be built upon the Village Green. Late in 1713 or 14 a Town meeting decreed that this new building was to "the Honour of Allmity God in ye purity of holy Religion & in quallyte of a Presbeterian Meeting House for Ever, and No other use or uses Watsoever..."

It is presumed that the choice front seats were always occupied by men. Seats for women and others were according to prices paid for pews. Prices ranged from 20 shillings for front seats to 2 shillings for those in the rear. Certain pews were for young men and boys and others were for young girls. One pew was free. Captain Clarke and Joseph Tocker were given the somewhat onerous duty of seating the congregation according to the prescribed plan, but the irritation of the people at his arrangement was so great that it was discontinued in 1719.

Rev. Phillips enjoyed a long and illustrious ministry, serving until his death in 1739. The third pastor was the Rev. David Young, the grandson of Rev. John Young, the first minister of Southold. Dr. David Young was born in 1719 and died in 1753. He was a graduate of Yale.

NOTE: Mention of Rev. David Young is made because a son of Isaac JAYNE (2) and his wife Mary Jones Jayne, had a son, Jotham JAYNE who married Desiah Youngs or Young. They had a son, John Youngs JAYNE. Desiah Youngs was born in 1739. She is not a daughter of Rev. David Young of the Estauket Presbyterian Church, but she was perhaps a descendant of Rev. John Young, the first minister of the Southold Church, L.I. (From a "History of the First Presbyterian Church of Southold, L.I. 1640-1940")

#### Long Island

The First Church of Christ in Southold, was organized in the year 1640, under the leadership of the Rev. John Youngs (Youngs) from Southold, England. Rev. John Youngs was a son of Christopher Youngs, Reverend, Vicar of Southold, England 1611-1626.

HOUSE OF JAYNE

THE JAYNE FAMILY IN BERGLAND

Between the years of 1654 60 1663 a total of over ten thousand passengers sailed from Bristol, England to America. A search of these Log Lists published in 1929 show several interesting notations and entry.

On page 51 of the old log book may be found this entry.

JOHN JAYNES (sic) of Landethelo Destination, Barbadoes

On page 61.

THOMAS BIGGS Destination, Barbadoes

On page 62.

ANN JAYNE of Bristol, Destination, Barbadoes

G. PHILLIPS of Landenavore, Destination, Barbadoes.

Author's note:

From historical research of these years will be found untold persecutions of the followers of the Puritan faith. How they fled from England without proper log entry of name, with the destination unknown or assumed. Many of the younger members pledged their troth upon the entry of their names in the log book and were married during the voyage.

It may be accurately stated that the above JOHN JAYNES, whose signature has been questioned in the log book is none other than WILLIAM JAYNE, (Our Progenitor). That the above Thomas Biggs is the future father-in-law of WILLIAM JAYNE.

That ANN JAYNE was a sister of Our Progenitor, and that she married G. Phillips and that they were of the first settlers of Setauket and Brookhaven, L.I. Early records show that Mr. Phillips was called as minister of Brookhaven in 1682 and served 43 years until 1735 and in 1738 a deed for real estate was given to him in recognition for his services, in which one of the signers was WILLIAM JAYNE (2), a trustee of Brookhaven, who was the eldest son of WILLIAM W. JAYNE (1) Our Progenitor.

Compiler's note: If ANN JAYNE was the wife of Rev. George Phillips, she must have been a first wife, because according to records from the Historical Society of Brookhaven at Patchogue, L.I., he had another wife. According to these records Rev. George Phillips died June 17, 1739, born June 3, 1664, son of Samuel Phillips and Sarah Appleton Phillips. He was the 2nd settled minister of the 1st Presbyterian Church of Brookhaven at Setauket, Sarah died in 1746 age 78 widow of Rev. George Phillips. (No maiden name given for Sarah.)

This is sufficient proof of our heirloom of religion, a momentous gift, that has descended through many generations of the JAYNE FAMILY, the chain of which remains unbroken, as in each generation we may boast of one minister in each family, and continuing until this present date.

From the records of E.H. Jayne, Chicago, Illinois# 1939

Barbadoes of the West Indies Island was discovered in 1518 and has always been a British possession. This made an easy place for British subjects to go to escape persecution. From there they could migrate to America with less danger of discovery.

Mr. Eben H. Jayne claimed to have done a great deal of research on the JAYNE family. He was of the same generation as Benajah Gustin (B.G.) JAYNE, who spent many years looking up family history. B.G. was a descendant of JOHN JAYNE (4) a brother of EBENEZER JAYNE (4). What became of this research and records is unknown, except what is included in this record. It includes letters from these two JAYNE men.

WILLIAM JAYNE(1) the immigrant married Annie Biggs at New Haven, Conn. on June 10, 1675. She was then 22 years of age and he 57 years of age, a widower with grown sons in England. They then moved to Brookhaven, L.I. on June 11, 1676. Later he and his wife conveyed several parcels of land at Setauket, L.I. to different parties. On Oct. 12, 1701 he was one of the trustees of the town Brookhaven.

Some records state that his wife, Annie Biggs, was a daughter of Thomas Biggs, but she was the widow Biggs, and the daughter of John Jennings, according to other records as well as the will of John Jennings.

In 1694 he married his third wife, the second in this country, Mehitable Jenkins or Jenners, a widow, by whom he had one son, STEPHEN JAYNE born 1700.

This is the copy of a letter to Mrs. Anna E. Smith (Mrs. David R. Smith) of Towanda, Penna., Bradford Co. (present address (1965) 363 York Avenue, Towanda, Penna.,

It was written by Eben H. JAYNE, attorney at law, 1132 Conway Bldg. 111 W. Washington Street, Chicago, Ill. He was a descendant of Rev. Ebenezer JAYNE, the father of Dr. David JAYNE of Philadelphia.

Dear Madam;

I am very pleased to receive your letter of the 23ult., and find upon investigation of my records that our relationship is very close. Your great grandfather, ISAAC JAYNE, was a brother of my great grandfather, Rev. EBENEZER JAYNE, who as you perhaps know was the father of Dr. DAVID JAYNE, the celebrated physician of Philadelphia.

I also have two daughters that are D.A.R. of the Chicago Chapter, whose membership was through Rev. EBENEZER JAYNE, who served as a Lieutenant from New Jersey, assigned to the Regiment commanded by Captain TIMOTHY JAYNE of Northampton Co., Penna., who from historical records was one of the most noted captains in the Revolutionary War.

Compiler's note: Captain TIMOTHY JAYNE was also a brother of ISAAC and EBENEZER JAYNE, sons of WILLIAM JAYNE (3) and his wife, Tabitha Norton Jayne. (L.J.D.)

May I explain that I have spent some 5 years of careful research into English and American records as to the JAYNE family. I have been assisted by my daughter, who is connected to the Newberry Library in which is housed one of the largest genealogical collections in the United States. From my research I have secured a vast amount of true history and information concerning the JAYNE family and may I state that it is an ancestry that each and all of us with the name of JAYNE can well be proud.

I can only give you a short resume of the English family, however it will suffice to show you the origin of the Coat of Arms which I have had completed and am very proud of.

"The origin of the family of WILLIAM W. JAYNE (1), our progenitor, was of Norman or Celtic ancestry, claiming through the celebrated Sir William ap Thomas Herbert, Knight of Raglan, who was a direct heir of a certain Herbert, Chamberlain of Henry I, and continued through 9 generations to Jenkins ap Adam, the ancestor in the fifth degree of Black William, Earl of Pembroke, a well-known supporter of the claims of Edward IV. The family seat known as Wain-ddu, is in the Parish of Ilantilio Pertholey, County of Abergavenny, Wales."

"Javen Herbert was 7th in line of one branch of the HERBERT FAMILY, living at Brockweir in 1562; his son, Thomas ap Javen Herbert alias THOMAS JAYNE of Tintern in 1562, was 8th in line and is the first member of the JAYNE family in England; his son, WILLIAM JAYNE, of Bristol, England in 1548 or the 9th in line; his son, WILLIAM JAYNE of Brockweir and Chepstow or 11th in line (our progenitor).

I have a complete family tree of the HERBERT FAMILY, also the JAYNE FAMILY also the PERKINS FAMILY (Our progenitor's first wife's family name.)

Compiler's note: This wife undoubtedly was the wife he married in England, as his first wife in America was Annie Jenkins or Jenners Biggs. She was the widow Annie Biggs when she married WILLIAM JAYNE (1) immigrant, our progenitor.)

I may add that WILLIAM JAYNE's (1) first wife belonged to a very prominent and wealthy family, a part of the Morgan clan of Wales. I may add that I have checked back on the English family of JANE, JAMES and JANS and can state that they are no relation to the JAYNE FAMILY. As to the American families of JANE, JAYNES, JAMES, it is possible that some of our family of that name, due to the spelling of the name in early American records. Up to 1800 I have some Wills filed on Long Island under the name of JANE and upon investi-

gation found that correction had been made to JAYNE.

Very complete records as to the families of the sons of our progenitor, have been ascertained, namely William II, John, Matthais, Samuel and Stephen. As to SAMUEL JAYNE, I have found his will and he had taken the name of JAYN. (Compiler's note: Evidently in copying the "E" was left off.)

Outside of this information I cannot find any other records as to the families of SAMUEL JAYNE as I am sure that none exist. Also there are no records for James, the brother of Samuel Jayne. (Compiler's note: A record of the family of SAMUEL JAYNE has been found in Crange Co., N.Y., where SAMUEL JAYNE migrated from Long Island. The record of his family will be included in this book.

I have nearly completed a volume on the life of our progenitor with complete information as to his English and American life. It is quite possible that I will publish same and have it placed in various large libraries for reference. As to the other vast information I have of the many families of the name JAYNE in America, it is my intention to file it with the NEWBERRY LIBRARY here in Chicago.

I may add that the parents of our progenitor were large ship builders of Bristol, England and considered quite wealthy. Our progenitor may have been educated for the ministry, however he was not ordained in this country, but he assisted in building the church and preached in same at Setauket, L.I. and was the Capital man of Brookhaven. He filled many important positions as Merchant, Puritan, Presbyterian, Ruling Elder, Teacher and Trustee.

His descendants have followed every profession, been successful and above all, upright citizens, and with it all you will find the blood-stream of religion in each one and a sacred reverence for the name of JAYNE. My entire purpose in making the search is just one, that we, THE JAYNE FAMILY OF AMERICA will honor his name and that his life's history and name remain sacred until the resurrection.

Excerpt from a letter by EBERT H. JAYNE of Chicago, Ill. to Mrs. Anna Smith (Mrs. David R. Smith) of Towanda, Penna. Written 1939, Sept. 30

During my research I also found a WILLIAM JEANE, as one of the founders of New Haven, Conn. in 1643. Later he went to Northampton, Penna, and founded that colony, and changed his name to JANE, and today he is credited as the founder of the JANE family in America. I have had the privilege to read original letters written by the settlers of Northampton Co. during the years of 1650 and find that this party is not related to our family. However he is of the JANE family in England.

In my search along the way, I found JAYNE members in various states of the Union, and so have tried to parcel them out to their various branches, which means that I have a vast number of families, and I am very proud to say that there is an endless number of excellent families among which are classed educators and professionals. Of course I am of the family of WILLIAM JAYNE (33) and have always felt that this branch was the best, and so perhaps have you, however change your mind in this respect, for all the other branches are equal to our own branch.

Perhaps you have a record of Dr. DAVID JAYNE of Philadelphia. His eldest son was HENRY LABARRE JAYNE, lawyer, born in Philadelphia in 1857. At the time of his death he was very wealthy, and established what is known as the HENRY LABARRE JAYNE FOUNDATION.

Recently I located a book entitled "Mr. Richard Baxter's Narrative" written by JOHN FRANCIS JAYNE, Bishop of Chester, England. In this book the Bishop writes at some length concerning the HERBERT family of England in 1633. It is interesting reading. Year 1910. Lib.No. is E-5-D-3351 New England Historical Society.

I wish to thank you for your information as to WILLIAM JAYNE (3), as Signer of the Pledge of Loyalty. I did not have this item. My daughter will be pleased to use this for receiving an extra BAR in the D.A.R.

There are over 50 or more very complete books on library shelves concerning the family of JAYNE and we have only one by EDWARD H. JAYNE of Mt. Vernon, N.Y. which concerns mostly his ancestors STEPHEN JAYNE (2) and his family. It really puts us of the WILLIAM JAYNE (2) family to shame to think that some member of the family should not have compiled our records before this, rather than wait 300 years to have it done. It is my aim that they should know this wonderful ancestry.

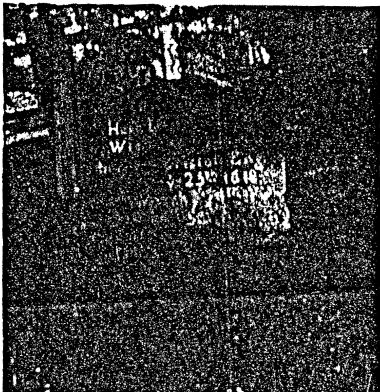

"HERE LYES YE BODY OF WILLIAM JAYNE -1618-1714"

For more than two centuries and a half the tombstones of William Jayne, the emigrant, once a chaplain to Cromwell, has stood in the cemetery of the Setauket Presbyterian Church, Setauket, Long Island, New York. Slightly shadowed by the branches of a nearby long-leaf pine tree, it is said to be the oldest tombstone in that ancient burial ground. (Edward H. Jayne, "Ancestry of the Jayne Family of Long Island," p.3). Its quaint old inscription reads:

Here Lyes ye Body of  
WILLIAM JAYNE  
born at Bristol, Eng.  
Janry ye 25th 1618  
Dec'd March ye 24th 1714  
AE 96

It is a plain, substantial stone--perhaps in character with the staunch old Puritan pioneer whose grave it marks. Of coarse granite weathered to an off-white, it is almost square in shape, arched at the top.

It is in the old section of the cemetery, back of the church. Other antique headstones keep it company, some of early Jayne descendants. It would be hard to find a more peaceful resting place. But it was not ever thus.

During the American Revolution the Presbyterian meeting house was seized by the British and fortified. The pulpit was destroyed and the interior used for stabling horses. An embankment was built around the church, and many of the tombstones were knocked down and used for fireplaces. But the original Jayne gravestone seems to have been spared. It looks sturdy enough today to stand for another 251 years, and it is difficult to realize that war once ravaged this peaceful spot.

One is somewhat prepared for the quiet serenity after driving off the highway and through the less hurried roads of Setauket. A rather rambling village, it was obviously built when there was land to spare, and comprises a picturesque blend of the old and the new.

Among the historic houses to be found there are the Brewster House, the Thompson House, and the old Jayne House, known as the Sherwood-Jayne House. It is believed to have been built by a son of the first William Jayne about 1730, the east end of the main structure perhaps being added about 1790. It was occupied by the Jayne family for nearly two hundred years, until about 1908, when it was bought by Mr. Howard C. Sherwood. He used it for a summer home and restored it tastefully and authentically--even to the sheep one sees grazing in its adjacent meadow.

The house is a gray shingle, "saltbox" type, facing south on the Old Post Road, just off Route 25-A, in East Setauket. The surrounding walnut trees stand like sentinels, front and back. The house was bequeathed by Mr. Howard C. Sherwood to the Society for the Preservation of Long Island Antiquities, of which he was a founder. It has been written up in Antiques Magazine.

It is open to the public several days a week in summer from 1 to 5 P.M.--this year (1965) from May 1 to October 31. A guide shows the visitor through, courteously and informatively. Admission for adults is 50¢; for children 7 - 14, 25¢. A color postcard view and descriptive sheets are available at the house.

It is no great distance, perhaps a mile, more or less, to the Setauket Presbyterian Church and Cemetery, along the same roads probably followed by the early Jaynes to the Meeting House.

The late spring day my husband and I were there, May 12, 1965, all Long Island was ablaze, and the sun cast a glow over the new-leaved trees in front of the church. Approaching it as we did, one comes first to the new part of the cemetery, which stretches down from behind the church to the street. One of the first plots we sighted was one containing several Jayne tombstones, but the marble was too new looking for that of the first William Jayne to be among them, as investigation proved it was not.

We headed for the church for help, passing up the more formal main building--a conventional New England type structure of gray shingle with white trim--for the less formal Sunday School addition. There we found the Church Secretary, Mrs. Carl Hulse, who conducted us around the front of the church to a kind of garden gate that led back into the old section of the cemetery. Pausing a moment to take in the scene, a line from Gray's "Elegy" came to mind, "And all the air a solemn stillness holds..."

Mrs. Hulse enlisted the aid of the Church Sexton to find the old William Jayne marker. The Sexton even supplied us with chalk with which to outline the fading inscription for a picture.

Tracing over the worn lettering brought thoughts of those early days. What changes had taken place since the first William Jayne, a widower past fifty, having fled England somewhat after the restoration of Charles II, came with his second wife, the twenty-two year old Annie Biggs (Beggs), across the Sound from New Haven, Conn. in about 1675, to settle in Setauket.

The little church had been organized some years before, and the first sermon said to have been preached from a large rock in front of the present church, by the Rev. Nathaniel Brewster, the first pastor. The Sabbath commenced Saturday evening, with the reading of the Word. Preparations for the day were made before, so that nothing should disturb the calm of the Sabbath--except perhaps Obad Seward's beating of the drum to call the worshippers to service, or the congregation's singing of Psalms set to the music

of familiar tunes.

In 1669 at a town meeting a church building was first ordered. It must have been there that the first William Jayne worshipped. It was remodeled from time to time and used for both town meeting and church service until the year of his death, 1714, when a new church was built on the old site. That year also Colonel Richard Floyd gave the town one-half acre of land for the purpose of enlarging the burial ground, and our William Jayne was laid to rest, full of years and honors, aged 96.

The present church building is "only" about a century and a half old--dedicated May 24, 1812--but it retains something of the early atmosphere in its dignity and reverence. Our first William Jayne might well have felt at home there.

The name Jayne is a changed form of the name "de Jeanne". William was a son of Henry de Jeanne, a graduate of Oxford University, who became a lecturer on Theology and Divinity there. The name "de Jeanne" is said to have first appeared in England when Guido de Jeanne, Henry's ancestor, a general in the service of the French Confederation, accompanied Henry II to England and placed him upon the throne. Guido was then knighted and given the Manor of Kirkling in Cambridgeshire and command of the English armies. Our William was a student at Oxford when he became a dissenter and joined Cromwell's forces, where he became a chaplain. After the restoration of Charles II, he changed his name to Jayne to escape religious persecution, and later, after the death of his wife, fled to America.

He landed at New Haven, Conn. about 1670, where he married Annie Biggs about 1675. They had five sons and two daughters. By his third wife, Mehitable Jenkins, a widow, he left a sixth son.

There are today innumerable Jaynes in the United States--in the cities, the small towns, and on the farms--all across the country, descendants of that first William, who sleeps so peacefully in the old Setauket Presbyterian burial ground "in the bosom of his Father and his God!"

Following is a letter from the town of Brookhaven, L.I., Office of the Town Historian

January 23, 1959

Dear Mrs. Hare:

I am quoting from a letter which I found in the Historical File written to Miss Kate Strong, dated Feb. 3, 1939, from Brookhaven, Miss.

"I will tell you what we have found out about Col. Samuel Jayne, and the little settlement he organized. In 1818, Anselm Helme Jayne came to Mississippi, where Samuel Jayne and Brewster Jayne, two elder brothers had preceded him, these two settling in what was then Lawrence County at Jayneville (which was named in his honor) and Samuel and Brewster Jayne were among the first merchants of Brookhaven and Monticello. In 1850, Samuel Jayne organized a little settlement one and one half miles south of the present Brookhaven, named it, as we have supposed for his home town on Long Island. A four room log house was built on a rolling slope overlooking a stream where he had a grist mill. This house was used as a dwelling and store. Quite a little hamlet sprang up there, but when the railroad survey was made in 1851, it didn't pass right by his little town, so the settlers moved a short distance north, following the railroad (which is now the Illinois Central), taking the name Brookhaven to the new location. This first settlement, from that time to the present, has been known as "Old Brook". There isn't anything left to mark it; the place where the village stood, except two rows of stately cedar trees that lead up to the site of Col. Jayne's house.

Evidently a cemetery on the plantation of Mr. M. J. Whitworth, one of the early settlers living near by, was used by all those living in the community at that time for we have found in this old deserted cemetery a tombstone (now fallen and broken in half) with the following inscription carved on it:

WILLIAM JONES JAYNE

Youngest son of the late William Jayne of Setuket, L.I.  
Who departed this life Sept. 8, 1835  
Died after an illness of 7 days of congestive fever  
Age 21 years

We have no information concerning when or where Mr. Jayne died and was buried. Mrs. Jayne is said to have been left a widow and married a Capt. Milan who had come down from West Point to manage her plantation. I can't be positive about where he came from. Some of the late descendants of the family have lived in Brandon, Miss. for a number of years, and one, a young man, R.K. Jayne, lives in Jackson, Miss.

When Lincoln County was formed in 1870, Brockhaven was made the county seat. It is located in the hills of south Mississippi, a thriving town of 5,288 inhabitants.

The family of Jaynes living in Brandon lost their family Bible in a fire and with it much valuable data which they haven't been able to replace.

Much of the information I have about the family has come from "Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Mississippi" Vol. I, published by the Goodspeed Pub. Co. of Chicago in 1891

Following is a letter copied by Lawrence M. Jayne, Mentor, Ohio, found in the Library of San Antonio, Texas. The article was taken from "Biographical History of Navarro, Henderson, Freeston and Leon Counties. by Lewis Publishing Company 1893

A. A. Jayne, a land agent and surveyor of Croesbeck, Limestone County, was born in Simpson Co., Miss. Dec. 13, 1838, a son of Brewster H. Jayne, who served as Judge and State Senator of Miss. twelve years. He (Brewster) was born Aug. 19, 1789, was highly educated, and was a lawyer by profession. He came to Texas in 1840, locating at Austin with President Lamar's family, but two years later was killed by Indians. On Sept. 30, 1828, he (Brewster) married Julia, a daughter of Mary and Amos Sims, and to this union was born five children:

Narcissa, deceased, was the wife of W. B. Williams of Brandon, Miss.

Juliette T. Jayne, widow of Dr. A. C. Camp

A. A. Jayne, our subject

Caroline Jayne, wife of Dr. T. V. McFarland of Lavaca, Texas

The grandfather of our subj. WILLIAM JAYNE, was born in Suffolk Co. N.Y. in 1766—was highly educated, and died Mar. 19, 1826. The history of his father is unknown, but his grandfather,

WILLIAM JAYNE, was born in Bristol, England, Jan. 25, 1818, was the founder of the family in the United States and died in New York March 24, 1874.

A.A. JAYNE, our subject, returned with his mother and his sisters to Brandon, Miss., in 1849, was shot by an arrow and twice in possession of Indians. He opened the Bostrop (Louisiana Academy) in Sept. 1860, but after managing it one scholastic year, the call to arms was irresistible and he enlisted in Company G Twenty eighth Miss. Reg, under Colonel Peter B. Stark. In the fall of 1862 he was detailed to Harvey's Scouts, where he served the remainder of the war. He had many narrow escapes from death and capture, and near the end of the war, he was picked up by a gunboat and carried to Vicksburg, but soon succeeded in making his escape. In 1867, Mr. Jayne returned to Texas from Louisiana, where he had spent one year teaching and keeping books and was given the position of inspector of lands for the Houston and Texas Central Railroad, which he held several years. After his retirement, he located in Groesbeck, Texas, and has since devoted his time to surveying and selling lands. He is a member of the Masonic Order.

Dr. T. V. McFarland, husband of Caroline Jayne, was a (don't know how many) great grandfather of Mr. Ray Bostick, who lived next door to our son, David Jayne and his wife Janey.....Jayne, when they were in San Antonio, Texas. Thought that was interesting!!

As you will note this article did not trace Amos Jayne's ancestry too well, but I believe it is down pretty close. Also note that SAMUEL JAYNE, a brother to Judge BREWSTER JAYNE, founded the town of Brooklin, Miss. Now you may remember I wrote in a previous letter that we had met a Captain JAYNE last fall at Ft. Belvoir, Va., a friend and neighbor of our David's Well, we believe he is descended from SAMUEL JAYNE and we hope to be corresponding with this family in Brooklin, Miss.

#### THE JAYNE FARM IN KELLOGGSVILLE

When the Revolutionary War was over many of the fighting men... and many others, too... felt that some sort of bonus was in order. Not much interested in money because at that time it was generally considered to be "not worth a Continental", many thought that, since there was so much of it, a gift of land would be highly desirable.

Finally, a grateful New York legislature set aside, in 1789-90 a Military Tract of more than 1,500,000 acres east of Seneca Lake and reaching from the southern tip of that lake to the shores of Lake Ontario. According to their rank, then, to veterans of the state received warrants of land in this choice area, ranging from a gift of 5500 acres for a major general down to 500 acres for a non-commissioned officer or private. As is generally well-known, many of the veterans sold or traded their allotments to speculators. Among those who settled on their tract... or part of it at least... was JOTHAM JAYNE. Family tradition has it that no less than six Jayne brothers served in the Revolutionary War, unfortunately, the original military warrant became lost but it is a definite fact that JOTHAM JAYNE did come here to the wilderness land, finding a place where a spring of water bubbled out, the site of his first cabin was determined by this happy circumstance of a convenient water supply. As of now it has never gone dry

Governor Dewey and all those here assembled: (Date..abt.1940)

When a New York State farmer and his family are summoned to stand before their Governor in order that they may receive his citation conferring upon them membership in the Order of Century Farmers, it is fitting and just that there be publicly set forth the circumstances and reasons why this high distinction has come upon them.

Concerning the exact beginnings of this family, they themselves are not certain. The original military grant (warrant) has been lost nor does their appear to be any record of the title of this property in the Clerk's Office of the County of Cayuga. There is a family tradition that no less than six JAYNE brothers served in the Revolutionary War and one of them, JOTHAM JAYNE, a great-great-great grandfather of the present head of the clan received a warrant to this farm as a reward for his military service. It was in the year 1790 when almost all of Cayuga County was still an unbroken wilderness that this first proprietor trekked through the forest to take possession of the land which had fallen to him. He found a place where a stream of water bubbled out and as was so frequently the case, the site of his first cabin was determined by the circumstance of a convenient water supply. Pioneer Jotham seems to have prospered in his ways because before his death he built him a frame house, low and substantial and plain as were the houses of that day. That house, improved and modernized, still shelters the four sons who represent the sixth generation of his line. Jotham, as his burial slab attests, has been lying now for a hundred and twenty six years among his kin on a pleasant hill-slope which was, and still remains, a part of the family acreage. It was just eighty years ago that his son, JOHN, came to lie beside his father. It was fifty-nine years ago that his grandson, ANSON, passed on and, as the family now feel, was unfortunately buried in the village cemetery. Today three generations still survive. There is a grandfather, MONSEN JAYNE, of seventy-three years, a grandson, LAWRENCE M. JAYNE, of forty-nine, and a son, LAWRENCE S. JAYNE, of twenty-four who is a graduate of the State College of Agriculture at Cornell and who has for two years been a member of the United States Army in the South Pacific Theater, even as his father served in Europe in World War I.

A neighbor who has always known the family in most intimate fashion makes this appraisal of their contribution to the Community. This neighbor writes "The whole family are members of the Kelloggsville Methodist Episcopal Church and the father belongs to the Farm Bureau and the Dairymen's League. They have been active supporters of all good things in the community such as the Red Cross and the War Bond Drives. Their characters are beyond reproach and as a family would be a credit to any community." Such I say is the testimony of one who has known them through many years.

And now, Governor Dewey, because it is certain that this one of the most ancient farm families of this region of the state, and because for six unbroken generations by direct descent in the male

line they have given allegiance to the same plot of ground and because I believe that in a most unusual degree they represent and symbolize that social and economic stability and those standards of intelligence and conduct which constitute the best hope of Democracy, I earnestly recommend that you make citation of the present head of the clan, LAWRENCE M. JAYNE and his wife, Mary Sheldon Jayne, designating them as members of the Honorable Order of Century Farmers, this distinction to descend to those who come after them so long as they shall continue proprietors of the acres that gave them birth.

Family of Martin Jayne coincides with Census Records of 1850 and 1860. He signed papers as Martin S. Jayne (S probably for Sims). The dau. of Caldonia Kleanor, gave me the names of as Minerva Elizabeth Daugherty.

1860 Census Records give Martin S. Jayne age 40; Marian E. age 30; Wm. 13; Mary E. 11; Butler F. 10; Hannah L. 8; Eleanor C. 4; Margaret A. A. 3; John N. F. 1.

This makes a discrepancy between the age as given in Rodney Warren Bible and the Census Records. I am wondering if another dau. used the name, Elizabeth or had it as a second name. It is most likely that Hannah Sims Jayne names her first dau. Elizabeth after her mother. This may have been Eleanor Elizabeth who is listed as living with Hannah Jayne in 1870. Perhaps she later mar. Mr. Wilson and went to Kentucky.

From the dates he could be just older than Wheeler who was 26 in 1850, but the names of the grandchildren could be a son of Martin. Dates do not allow this, so we must place him as a son of James and Hannah. This is one of the questioners.

I am returning your letter which you requested. I had part of it copied as I had some ink spattered on it as I was writing some notes.

There are some discrepancies between various records which are available and these I aim to correct, as many as I can find.

Henry Jayne, we know, was placed on the lists of exempts June 21, 1775, Orange Co. N.Y. His son James could not have been born in Washington Co.,Va. Mar.14, 1774. In the Census of 1850, James states that he was born in N.Y. James' death record in Lee Co., Va. states he was born in N.Y.

James Jayne had 11 children -at least 3 by his first wife, Barbara Wilson, whom he mar. Washington Co.,Va July 23, 1795-Ref. Fleet's Marriage Records of Washington Co.,Va.

He mar. Hannah Sims ( 1 S) dau. of James and Elizabeth Sims, date unknown but at some date between 1803 and 1808.

Abigail born 1803 mar. Henry Daugherty--all legal records have this spelling. They had 9 or 10 children. The Census of 1850 lists 9 children, the youngest 2 years old. Then in 1860 Census an Abigail age 20, is listed. She should be between Lucy, age 12 and Wm. age 9. The son called Wheeler in 1850, is listed as Henry W. in 1860.

Catherine or Katy mar. Martin Sims. The SIMS lineage lists Catherine Jayne as 1st wife and Sallie Milburn as his sec. wife, but the Census Records of 1850-60 and 70 give her name as Lucy and she was 10 years younger than Martin. In 1850--Family #1484 they had John age 27 and Dorcas age 22 and Hannah J. age 73 in the home. Just who she was, I have not found out. (The sister of James and Stephen)

I have been given the information that Martin Sims mar. Teressa Warren and moved to Missouri, Martin Sims lived and died in Lee Co., Va. James Daugherty, son of Abigail Jayne and Henry Daugherty, mar. Teressa Warren and moved to Mo.

The Munsey Genealogy gives William Munsey as marrying Mary E.(?) Jayne, 1st. Three children- 1850- Hannah age 15; James age 13; Elizabeth age 11.

He then married Ruth Jayne, a dau. of Stephen Jayne and a cousin of Mary's father, James. This is proved by the Will of STEPHEN JAYNE--WB II-p.385, Lee Co., Va. He states....my two granddaughters, Melissa and Mary Munsey....and he also names " his only living daughter, Hannah Davault". Stephen's will was dated July 19, 1860. So Ruth died between the time of the taking of the Census and the writing of the Will in July. A dau., Martha age 1 year, was not named in the will so either she died also or Stephen Jayne did not know of her existence.

His dau. Hannah Davault, widow of William, was 33 in 1860 had children: Mary E. age 8; John E. age 5; Jacob W. age 3 and Stephen Jayne age 76 in the home. William Davault was son of Jacob D. and was born in Sullivan Co., Tenn.

To return to Martin Sims-- In 1820 Census Records, he was under 26, yet he had a male 10/16 in his home. I think this was his brother as there were 2 f. under 5.

NOTE: James and Stephen Jayne were brothers. SEE children of HENRY JAYNE (4).

"My grandfather on my father's side was Martin Jayne. He passed away when I was around 18 months of age from pneumonia. Grandfather Jayne was around 72 years of age when he passed away. He reared his family, I think 10 children, in Lee Co., Va. He helped to build 1 courthouse, county seat in Jonesville, Virginia. He was a farmer and when they left Virginia for southwest Missouri, near Washburn, Missouri, he sold his farm which then brought about 5 thousand dollars. They moved to Missouri when my father and twin brother, the youngest of the children, were somewhere about 20 to 22 years of age."

"Grandfather Jayne moved to Missouri when he was in his late 50's. Grandmother Jayne was a Daugherty and I can fairly remember her and her mother who came to Missouri with them and lived with them until her death. I remember grandmother Jayne's mother only slightly as I was very young when she died and I remember her as grandmother Daugherty. I remember that one of my gr-grandmothers was a Warren."

(NOTE: In a later letter Dr. Jayne stated that he thinks he was really too young to remember his great-grandmother---that his recollection must have come from hearing his family talk about her.)

"Grandfather and grandmother Jayne, great-grandmother Daugherty all were buried in Washburn Prairie Cemetery, near Washburn, Missouri, as well as my father and mother. I have heard the name Claybourne mentioned along with the Daugherty family and the Warren family, but I do not know the relationship."

One instance is the migration to Orange Co., N.Y. from Setauket, L.I. of a number of the JAYNE family.

NOTE: Henry Jayne (4) and Abigail Wheeler Jayne are said to have had other sons. L.J.D.

A letter from B.G.Jayne, dated Jan.1883, to his cousin, Charles Jayne of Edwall, Washington states; Henry Jayne and Abigail Wheeler Jayne had sons, James, William, Stephen and Wheeler. 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Dr. Benjamin Jayne states in one of his letters that he had found in a Kentuck record, where was recorded the marriage of Henry S. Jayne to Sarah Lyon, in Lawrence Co., Ky. on Mar. 22, 1855. Since my grandfather came from Carter Co., the adjoining county to the west and was named Jesse Lyon Jayne, and was born about 1860, it is my belief that Henry S. Jayne was my gr-grandfather. From here on I take it from a record by M. Hall who stated that a Daniel Jayne of Johnson Co., Ky. had 4 sons, Daniel, Henry, Tom, and William...that two of the sons married but later left their wives.

As little is known among the members of my family other than gr-grandfather's name was Henry and that he apparently never returned from the Civil War and was never heard from after that time. Hence it is very evident that his name being Henry and my grandfather's name was Jesse Lyon that this man was Henry S. Jayne, who married Sarah Lyon and Henry, the son of Daniel, who left his wife, are the same persch. So with this information, I have constructed my line as follows:

Henry Jayne was born in Orange Co., N.Y. 1754. He was exempt from Military service in the Revolution in Orange Co., N.Y. Goshen Precinct, signed June 21, 1775 Age 21...possibly because he was an iron worker at the Sterling Iron Works there. The owner petitioned the colony three times for exemptions for his workers because the drafting

would take his men and he could not get the guns and cannons made for the Army. NOTE: All of the brothers of Henry, son of Isaac(3), served in the Revolution. Isaac is said to have had 5 sons and 3 daughters. Records of them may be found in this Jayne Family History. L.J.D.)

Following is a copy of the Will of Henry Jayne dated May 30, 1822. Filed Feb. 19, 1826. Washington Co., Virginia. Court House Record.

"I, Henry Jayne, give to my wife, Abigail, all of my estate except that which I devise; Daughters Charity and Sarah, Land; to my son Wheeler Jayne...land; my son Henry having departed this life leaving issue, a daughter, Farina, who inherits his estate, I give her but 1 dollar. 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Following are the notes from a letter from Benjamin A. Jayne while he was Associate Wood Technologist at the State University at Pullman, Washington, written to Dr. J.E. Jayne, son of Dr. Clarence Jayne. He was superintendent of Pioneer Research Laboratory, Kimberly Clark Division at Neeah, Wisconsin. His father, Dr. Clarence D. Jayne was a professor at the University of Wyo. at Laramie, Idaho.

"Dear Dr. Jayne: It would seem rare to find two individuals of the same name, with the same scientific interests, but also interested in genealogy. Local history has always been of great interest to me which led to questions when I was a youngster of "where did my grandparents come from" and the like. About 4 years ago I became interested. At the time I had just completed my Doctorate at Yale and was a member of the Yale Faculty of the Forestry School. I uncovered much the same history as that of your father about the early deJeanne name, etc., also the migration to Orange Co., N.Y. by a number of men by the name of Jayne, and some that went into Penna., Miss., Va., Ill., and Iowa.

Letter written to Dr. Clarence D. Jayne 1961:

"Dear Clarence; The trouble that you took to show me the relationship of my branch of the family is deeply appreciated. I had felt that the chances of ever making a connection were practically nil."

"A bit more about my family. They settled in Kentucky in the vicinity of Flat Gap about 15 miles from the present town of Paintville. Not that they were all in the same area. They seemed to have been scattered through the valleys that drain north into the Ohio and east into the Big Sandy River. As I recall there were about 3 generations from the original settler in 1810 down to my grandfather, Jesse Lyon Jayne, who married Mary Elizabeth Sellards. They were married about 1810.

They tried to farm and apparently were trying to buy a place. My uncle says that they built a house from hand split yellow poplar boards. I can't imagine anyone splitting yellow poplar, but it makes a good story.

In 1883, they and 3 other families, including my grandfather's brother, Columbus Jayne, started west by team and wagon for Kansas. One of the families was that of grandmother's father. His wife was dead and he was rearing the young family. My grandmother's brother was 7 years old at the time and had some memories of the trip. He later received his P.H.D. at Yale in Geology and became chairman of the Economic Geology Department at the University of Texas., also Director of the State Historical Museum and is now retired. 1961 date of letter.

They eventually settled in Pratt Co., Kansas, on homestead lands and starved out in about 3 years. Grandfather and his brother, Columbus Jayne then moved their families to Old Oklahoma near

Guthrie and worked as laborers until the Cherokee Strip opened in 1893. They both made the run and took up claims near (Cherokee?) near the present town of Covington about 20 miles east of Enid. Granddad purchased neighboring farms as other homesteaders folded and finally gave a farm to each of his 4 sons. He was a very hardworking man. My dad says he used to put 80-120 acres of wheat into cultivation with a team of horses and then hire out to the neighbors to put in their crops.

My grandparents had 10 children, 7 of which lived to maturity. Gertrude, Edward, Albert, my father, Jeanette, Mary and Jesse Lyon. Gertrude died leaving 1 daughter. Clint had 3 daughters, Ed had a son and a daughter. Albert, my father, had 2 daughters and myself. Jeanette had 2 daughters. Mary had 2 daughters and 1 son. Jesse Lyon had no children. Clint still lives in Enid and operated a travel agency. My parents live in Dallas, Texas. Jeanette and Ed live in Loveland, Colo., Mary and her family live in San Diego, California. No telling where Jesse Lyon is.

I met my wife while we were in college at the University of Idaho. Her home is in Twin Falls, Idaho. We have 3 youngsters, David Noel, Kristie Anderson and Sumner Leigh Jayne.

My immediate family came from Kentucky to Oklahoma in the 1880's. I have traced back to about 1880 when William settled at Flat Gap, Ky. In character they varied greatly. One established a school in Kentucky while my gr-grandfather left his wife to become a bushwhacker in the Civil War. Some made money and some died poor. I feel that perhaps my ancestors came from Pennsylvania as they had direct access to western lands by traveling up the Shenandoah River Valley, but since census records were burned during the War of 1812, I have been unable to establish a birthplace for my ancestors. Can you help me?

The three Jaynes, probably children of Henry Jayne of Flat Gap are Jesse Lyon Jayne, Henry Columbus Jayne, Sarah Jeanette (Jayne) Garble. Jesse Lyon Jayne was called "Dick" and Jesse Lyon Jayne Jr. was also called "Dick."

Notes from a letter from Albert Jayne:

Dear Miss Dull;

I have just returned from a trip to Arkansas, but I could not find anything about Henry or anyone that had ever heard of him. All that I know about the family is mostly hearsay. Dad told me very little. My older brother, Clint, knew some of the facts, which I am sure that Dad told him. The understanding is that Henry joined the Confederate Army when Dad was only a few months old, which would be in 1861 or 1862. He never came back home from the army. After the family had migrated to western Kansas in the early 1880's, the story goes that Dad and his brother, Henry

Columbus Jayne tried to locate him. My brother, Clint, told me that that one time Dad asked him to take a drive with him into Ark. I would guess the year was around 1920. Clint told me they made inquiries in several towns, but found out nothing about his dad. The whole story seems to be vague, but I am sure that there is a lot of truth in it.

NOTE: When Albert Jayne brought his daughter from Dallas to her home in Whittier, he phoned me and came to Pomona for a few hours visit about the Jayne family and various branches including his own, which was very interesting and helped me very much in tracing the line of this William Jayne who married Dorcas Reamy. With data which I had from Opal Sweazey Allen (Mrs. Wm.), Mrs. Gertrude Soderborg and Mrs. Eunice Bermain of Pasco, Wash., I have gotten a quite complete record of Henry Jayne, son of Isaac Jayne (3) and his wife Mary Jones. There will be included in this record, descendants of Benjamin and Jotham Jayne, who were brothers of Henry Jayne. With the help of all this data, I was able to trace this family back to Isaac Jayne (3) William Jayne (2) William Jayne (1), the immigrant to Setauket, L.I. 1668. Unfortunately the Albert Jayne data did not have any dates, and none for the early line that went to Flat Gap, Ky., as to births and marriage dates. One reading the James Jayne line, son of Henry will find much of interest. L.J.D.

Stephen's death record, Lee Co., Va.)

Evidently the first migration of the Jayne family from Long Island was to Orange County, New York. A letter of B.G. Jayne dated June 1906 to Charles JAZZIN of Edwall, Washington, states that William Jayne (2) "lived and died" in Orange County, N.Y., and is buried in a Presbyterian Church Cemetery there.

William Jayne (2), born at Setauket, L.I., N.Y., June 4, 1673, died Oct. 1750; married Elizabeth Woodhull, born 1688, died on Dec. 10, 1710. Their children: 4 sons and 4 daughters

Thus there were a number of Jaynes in Orange County, N.Y., at an early date. William (3), son of William (2) was there, but migrated in 1755 to Northampton Co., Pa., with all his sons save one, William (4). William (4) was killed in the Revolutionary War, as was William (5).

ISAAC JAYNE (3), born 1715, son of William Jayne (2), who mar. Mary Jones, is said to have had 5 sons and 3 daughters.

The Pennsylvania Archives of the Revolution show the names of Benjamin, Jonathan, and Stephen Jayne, sons of Isaac Jayne of Goshen, N.Y., in Keltius' Battalion (commanded by Captain Timothy Jayne) of Hart's Flying Camp---as stated in Edward H. Jayne, "Ancestry of the Jayne Family on Long Island," p. 7 The same source, same page, cites the New York records as showing the names of Jotham Jayne

and Stephen Jayne in Captain Phineas Rumsey's Company. The Edward H. Jayne book, noted above, on p.19, gives the ancestry of Jotham Jayne, stating he was a son of Isaac Jayne, b.1715, married Mary Jones.

It is said that the 5th son of this Isaac, who married Mary Jones, was Henry Jayne, b. 1754. (Ref., E.G. Jayne letter dated Mar. 7, 1892 to Charles Jayne of Edwall, Washington, his cousin.

Also the record of Judge Ira Waite Jayne of Detroit names Henry as a son of Isaac Jayne above....said he had 5 or 6 sons and several daughters. Henry, Benjamin, Stephen and Jotham have descendants in this record.

HENRY JAYNE, son of Isaac Jayne (3), of Orange County, N.Y., was an exempt in the Revolution...probably because he was an iron worker. He migrated with his family to Washington Co., Va., where his name was on the tax list in the 1780's.

One of Henry Jayne's sons, William (5), went on from Virginia to Kentucky about 1810, and settled in the vicinity of Flat Gap near the present town of Paintville, Ky. and James Jayne (5) to Lee County, Va.

"The Jayne Century Farm Homestead"...near Kelloggsville, not far from Monrovia, N.Y.:

After the Revolutionary War, Jotham Jayne settled on a tract of land granted him as a veteran by the State of New York...part of a large Military Tract the New York Legislature set aside for its veterans. The N.Y. tract was east of Seneca Lake, reaching to the shores of Lake Ontario. Jotham Jayne built his first cabin on his land near a bubbling spring, which to this day is said to have never run dry.

The cabin has long since been replaced by a comfortable homestead. Still in the hands of the Jayne family, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence M. Jayne, descendants of Jotham, it has been cited by the State of New York as a Century Farm Homestead. Actually the house is about 150 years old.

In the old family burial ground on the farm, are the graves of Jotham Jayne and his wife, Desiah Youngs Jayne, also those of their son, John Youngs Jayne, his wife, Martha Smith Jayne, and three of their children.

Jotham Jayne, son of Isaac (3), son of Wm. (2), son of Wm. (1), was born in Smithtown, Long Island, N.Y., Mar. 4, 1758, died Mar. 14, 1819. He married Desiah Youngs, born Nov. 10, 1759, died Sept. 4, 1818. She was possibly, Desiah Youngs, descendant of Rev. John Youngs (Youngs), first pastor of the first church in

Southold, Long Island, N.Y., organized in 1640. The Rev. John Younges was a son of the Rev. Christopher Yonges, Vicar of Southold, England, 1611-1626. (Ref. Tercentenary Celebration booklet, First Presbyterian Church of Southold, L.I., N.Y. 1640-1940. p.11) The grave of the Rev. John Younges is in the Southold Presbyterian Cemetery.

DR. GARSHAM JAYNE, born Orange Co., N.Y., Oct. 15, 1791, was educated in New York, where he practiced medicine until 1820. In that year he migrated to Illinois, taking a flatboat down the Ohio River from Pittsburgh. He spent 6 months in southern Illinois before permanently locating in Springfield. (Ref. Journal of the Illinois State Historical Society, Vol. 9, No. 1 (April, 1916) p. 83)

DR. WILLIAM JAYNE-----Friend of Lincoln

First Legal Governor of Dakota Territory, 1861.

While one can no longer "shake the hand that shook the hand" of Lincoln, it may be of interest to read of a Jayne descendant who was his friend and physician in Springfield, Illinois, and who was appointed by Lincoln as the first Governor of Dakota Territory, 1861. This was Dr. William Jayne, born Oct. 8, 1826, in Springfield, Illinois, a son of Dr. Garsham and Sibyl Slater Jayne, died shortly after, Jan. 12, 1916.

Dr. William Jayne graduated from the University of Illinois and Missouri Medical College and practiced medicine in Springfield, Ill. He was 4 times elected Mayor of Springfield, was a State Senator, member of the Commission to complete the State Capitol Building; member of the Board of Education, president of the Library Board, acting president of the State Board of Charities; director of the First National Bank of Springfield, and for 10 years its vice-president.

Not unmindful, perhaps, of his pioneer ancestors, when he arrived in Yankton on May 17, 1861, he took up abode in what would today be 320 West Third St., where he found standing a log cabin. This cabin became both the executive mansion and the Dakota territorial capitol....which he shared with the Territorial Attorney General, W. E. Gleason of Maryland, who went to Yankton with Dr. William Jayne.

A highlight of Dr. Jayne's life, of which he often spoke to friends, was attending the inauguration of Abraham Lincoln, together with a party of Springfield men, March 4, 1861. (Ref.; Journal of Illinois State Historical Society, Vol. 9, No. 1 (Apr. 1916), pp. 83-85; also the Monthly Bulletin of the South Dakota Historical Society, "The Wi-iyochi," Vol. XI, No. 10 (Jan. 1, 1958)

Dr. William Jayne, son of Dr. Gersham Jayne, son of Jotham Jayne, married Oct., 1850 at Jacksonville, Ill.; Julia Witherbee, born in Vermont, 1830, died March 1877. She was a daughter of Seth and Elizabeth Witherbee, natives of Vermont who went to Illinois and Morgan County in 1834.

Children of Dr. William Jayne and Julia Witherbee Jayne:

William S. Jayne, born Oct., 1851, married 1875 Margaret E. Palmer, dau. of Governor John M. Palmer, but who died in May 1902, leaving 4 children: Perry, Louis, Susan and Margaret.

Lizzie S. Jayne, a dau., born July 1855. She married Oct. 1878 C. F. Kuechler and she died in 1902, leaving 2 children, Bessie and William Jayne Kuechler.

These are the only 2 children who reached maturity of the several children born to Dr. William and Julia Witherbee Jayne of Springfield, Ill.

Dr. William Jayne, b. Oct. 8, 1826, died between Jan. 12 and Feb. 8, 1916. He was survived by 1 son, William S. Jayne, and 6 grandchildren, Perry Jayne, Mrs. George A. Fish, Louis P. Jayne, Margaret Jayne, Elizabeth Kuechler, all of Springfield and William Jayne Kuechler, of Chicago, and 2 gr-grandchildren, William Louis Jayne and Margaret Ellen Jayne.

NOTE: From a letter written to me August 1963 from the First National Bank of Springfield, Ill. is stated the date of the death of Dr. William Jayne. He was a director from 1875 and served continuously to Jan. 12, 1916, which was the last meeting he attended. He was not re-elected.

"I have talked to Louis P. Jayne 419 E. Union Street, Springfield, Ill., who is a grandson of Dr. William Jayne, and he would be very happy to hear from you and furnish any other information that he has available. (I wrote to Louis P. Jayne but never received any reply.) From the Mayor of Springfield to whom I had written came this reply.

"Your letter of August 24, 1963 requesting information concerning the late Dr. William Jayne, 3 times Mayor of Springfield, Ill. and Governor of South Dakota by appointment of President Abraham Lincoln has been received. Mayor Jayne's picture hangs in our new Municipal Building, along with that of other mayors, and his name is well-known in Springfield history.

Notes from the Journal of the Ill. State Historical Society Vol. 9, No. 1 April 1961, p. 83;

An intimate acquaintance of the Doctor expresses it... "Anything you can say of Dr. Jayne will be good and you can't say too much for him. He fulfilled the ideals of service and completeness of life. The story of his life is a sermon rather than a biography... Governor of the South Dakota Territory, delegate to Congress from that Territory, pension Agent for

Illinois, State Senator, Mayor of Springfield, member of the Commission to complete the State Capitol Building, president of the Library Board. He served long and well. Dr. Jayne was on numerous occasions, called upon to fill positions of high honor and trust. Perhaps no man in Springfield had so extensive a knowledge of past conditions political, or financial. His mind was a veritable mine of information.

He is survived by 1 son, William S. Jayne and 6 grandchildren, P. Perry Jayne, Mrs. George A. Fish, Louis P. Jayne, Margaret Jayne, Elizabeth Jayne Kuechler of Chicago and 2 grandchildren, William Louis Jayne and Margaret Ellen Jayne.

William Jayne was born Oct. 8, 1826 in Springfield, a son of Gershom and S. byl. Slater Jayne. His branch of the family may be traced as Wm. (1) William (2) Isaac and Mary Jones Jayne (3), Jotham Jayne and Desiah or Desire Youngs his wife. Jotham was born Mar. 4, 1759 and his son Bershom was born in Orange Co., N.Y. Oct. 15, 1791 and was the father of Dr. William Jayne.

A description of Dr. Jayne from the S.D. Historical Society states that "he was of medium height, slightly inclined to portliness, wore a full beard; black bright eyes, looking like Andrew Carnegie. He was born in Springfield in 1826, graduated from the University of Illinois Medical College and settled to practice medicine in Springfield. He was only 26 when he was appointed Governor.

The father of Dr. William Jayne was Gershom Jayne. He was born in Orange Co., N.Y., Oct. 1791, son of Jotham Jayne, who received a grant of land from the Government for his military services during the American Revolution. Dr. Gershom Jayne was educated in N.Y. where he practiced medicine until 1820. In this year he came to Illinois, his route being down the Ohio River from Pittsburgh by flatboat. He spent 6 months in southern Illinois before permanently locating in Springfield, then a place of but a few homes,

NOTE: See data of Henry Jayne of Orange Co., N.Y., Jotham Jayne of Kelloggsville, N.Y., Judge Ira Waite Jayne of Detroit, Mich. for ancestry of Gershom and Dr. William Jayne.

Dr. Jayne could always gather a crowd of the younger generation around him when he began telling of the life of Springfield, when it was but a struggling little village. The old whipping post was used in those days when he was young and he often saw a man given lashes for misconduct.

Re: ELIZABETH WOODHULL JAYNE. There is quite a lot in Long Island records, about WOODHULL family, also spelled Wahull, Wodhull and also (or confused) with Odell.

The likeliest place for Elizabeth is in this family.

Comment. It is stated by genealogists that by a process of elimination these two Woodhull girls had to be descendants of the only man by the name of Woodhull on L.I. at that period.

NOTE: The next nine pages are copied from a different source. It is information extracted from a genealogy written by Eula Miller Spain, apparently of the Miller family, who had Jaynes and Woodhulls in their ancestry. Lillian Jayne Dull copied these tables and included them in her book, but by the time they had been copied, then microfilmed, copied again, and then recopied, they were illegible. So I copied them from the excerpts of the Spain document which I have.

## WOODHULL GENEALOGY

The Woodhulls, Jaynes, Biggs and Nortons were friends and neighbors in the town of Brookhaven, L.I. William Jayne I married a Biggs, William II married Elizabeth Woodhull and William III married a Norton. Richard Woodhull II was the only male Woodhull of the second generation to have children and so it is certain that Elizabeth was his daughter.

Richard Woodhull (Sept. 13, 1620-Oct. 17, 1690) came in 1648 to Jamaica L.I. In 1656 he bought 10,000 acres of land from the Indians at Setauket and two weeks later, turned the land over to the inhabitants. He was a surveyor and leading citizen of Setauket--Magistrate by General Court of Conn. 1661-1664; Deputy to General Court 1664-1666; one of His Majesty's Justices of the Honorable Court.

A letter from Lord Crewe to Richard Woodhull I has been preserved. He was a cousin by marriage to Richard. The letter follows:

"Sr

I was heartily glad, to find by y<sup>r</sup> letter, that it hath pleased God to blesse and prosper your family, and that you receiued the small present I sent you some time since w<sup>ch</sup> I thought had beene lost, for our Country newes take this account, My father departed this life Decem<sup>r</sup> 12, 1679, and as he lived well, soe he had greate joy at his death, with a longing to leave this world. I haue six children but noe sonne, it having pleased God to take him in y<sup>e</sup> 15<sup>th</sup> year of his age a man growne and very hopefull, God's will be done. My brother Walgrave hath left one sonne who stands heire both to ye Bishop of Duresme and my selfe, for Thenford Y<sup>r</sup> Cosen Wadhull lives very well, is a Justice of Peace and very well beloued, the three brothers live all together, with the greatest kindnesse that can bee. My Uncle Sal dyed last yeare & is buryed at Hinton, my Uncle Thomas a year before, my Uncle Nathaniel is still living. I haue enclosed the papers you desire. My service to all my Cosens. I rest y<sup>r</sup> loving friend and kinsman.

Crewe."

The gift in the letter is supposed to have been a panel depicting 18 quarterings (coat of arms) showing Woodhull bearing and the bearing of families marrying into the Wodhulls. The panel was carefully preserved and handed down in the Long Island Woodhull family for 7 generations. An "Ancient Document"--"The Originall of the family of the Wodhull fron the Conquest" was also handed down in the family. This is the document which may have been the one mentioned in the above letter. This is reproduced in the "Woodhull Genealogy"-pp 282-3-by Woodhull.

## SOME NOTES AND CORRECTIONS

It is noticed, in some records, of the Jayne family, that it is claimed that William Jayne married 2nd Elizabeth Sterling instead of Elizabeth Woodhull. It is evidently true that William Jayne (2) did marry an Elizabeth Sterling, but she was apparently his first wife, who did not live long and from whom no descendants have been named, in any records available to the compiler. The descendants of Elizabeth Woodhull and William Jayne (2) are those in this record. Edward H. Jayne record gives Elizabeth Woodhull as the wife of William Jayne (2)

Also some records give Abigail Strong as the wife of Joseph Jayne, b. 1730, son of William who married Elizabeth Woodhull. Edward H. Jayne record gives his wife as Abigail Gerard. Recent data from the Historical Society at Patchogue, Town of Brookhaven give the following;

William Gerard b. 1705, Will probated 1782. Children mentioned:

1. William, b. 1737-8
2. Azail, b. 1740
3. Zophar, b. 1742
4. Joseph, b. 1745

There was an Abigail Gerard (probably), a daughter born 1734, who married Joseph Jayne of Smithtown. They had a daughter, Abigail, b. Nov. 6, 1757.

Above copied from information in the genealogical file and Cemetery Record in the Town Historian's Office.

Re... Samuel Jayne who married Dinah Tocker. The name and dates from a Bible record should be for Samuel Jayne, son of Samuel and Dinah Tocker Jayne. Samuel Jr. had a son, Stephen, who married Sally Merwin.

There were a number of Jaynes who migrated to Orange Co., N.Y., which seems to have been the first exodus of several members of that family when a large tract of land was opened by the government. Samuel and his wife Dinah Tocker Jayne appeared to have been the first to settle there, followed by his father, William Jayne (2), who died and is buried in Orange Co. With him came the 3 sons of John and Sarah Woodhull Jayne, for whom he was the guardian. Nathaniel, Lieu. Daniel and Captain John Jayne.

At some where around this date, came Isaac and Mary Jones Jayne. His son, Henry Jayne, who married Abigail Wheeler, was born in Orange Co., N.Y. as may be seen by the Court and Census Records from Orange Co. They had a son, James Jayne, b. in Orange Co., for whom there is ancestral data in this record.

In Captain Rumsey's Company of N.Y. were Stephen, Benjamin and Zopher Jayne. Henry Jayne who was exempted from military duty. A Nathaniel Jayne lived in Orange Co. at Goshen and Cornwall, by papers he signed 1760-1768. Somewhere in some records, it has been stated that Nathaniel Jayne had been a Notary under the King. He later signed the Pledge of Loyalty.

A Zopher Jayne died in 1791 in Wythe Co., Va. Wife and children not named.

A Nathaniel Jayne died in Surrey Co., N.C. in 1793 leaving sons, Stephen and Henry; granddaughters, Hannah and a sister, daughters of his son, William Jayne. Wife Elizabeth. Date of Will not included.

James Jayne born 1774 was a son of Henry Jayne b. Feb. 17, 1754.. (See data for James and William Jayne in this record.)

New York..Calendar of Wills..Orange Co., N.Y. Liber 25, p.50, Oct. 29, 1762. Samuel Jayne of Florida, Orange Co., N.Y. Wife Dinah, Dau. Mary, Son, Samuel.

There is a record of Samuel Jayne 1743 in Orange Co., and then to Yates Co. by 1833.

Nathaniel Jayne was of age in 1760 as he signed legal papers as a witness in Goshen 1760 in Cornwall in 1771 and 1768.

Signers of Associators June 15, 1775 Nathaniel, Stephen, Benjamin and Denial; Henry an exempt June 21, 1775, Vol. 1, N.Y. Archives, p. 289. Benjamin, Stephen and Zopher Jayne

Samuel Jayne and Dinah had several daughters. One, Ruth, married Captain John Jayne, her cousin.

\*\*\*\*\*ABRAHAM WOODHULL\*\*\*\*\*

"Friend and confidant of George Washington, head of the Long Island Secret Service during the Revolution, and operated under the alias of Samuel Culper Sr. To him and his associates have been credited a large share in the success of the army of the Revolution."

"Born in Setauket Oct. 7, 1760 in the original Woodhull Homestead, son of Richard and his wife, Margaret Smith...5th generation from Richard Woodhull? the original grantee of a large portion of Brookhaven Township. He was a Presbyterian, occupying a "pew of authority" in the church. He was a man of integrity, punctual and precise in his business relations. He freed his slaves long before they were legally free...filled numerous important positions, being magistrate in Setauket for many years, judge in the Court of Common Pleas 1793-1799, first judge of Suffolk Co. from 1799-1810."

"The middleman in the spy chain was ABRAHAM WOODHULL, a direct descendant of Richard Woodhull, one of the founders of the old Setauket Presbyterian Church on Long Island."

NOTE: In the record where I changed the ABRAHAM WOODHULL to Nathaniel Woodhull is not correct. It should be ABRAHAM WOODHULL who was the spy for General Washington.

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The Sherwood-Jayne House was opened to the public in June 1958, as an Historical Society and headquarters for the Society for the Preservation of Long Island Antiquities.

We, the descendants of William Jayne (1), the immigrant, owe a vote of thanks to Mr. Sherwood and his sister for their generosity in giving the "old Jayne Home" to be preserved as an Historical Heritage and for the funds with which to restore it and to maintain it at Setauket, Long Island, where William Jayne, the immigrant, settled about 1668-70 and from whom all Jaynes in this record are descended.

## NOTES....

A considerable amount of data and leads for tracing various JAYNES and their ancestry has been found in copies of letters written by B.G. Jayne. Some are copies of his letters and some are written in his own handwriting, especially those written to my mother, Eva Jayne Dull, about 1907-1908. I (Lillian Jayne Dull) have managed to collect quite a number of them from different branches of the family.

My interest began after reading his letters to my mother written about 1907, although it was many years before I really did much ancestor hunting, however, what he had written to my mother was sufficient to give me a good start on the Northampton Co., Pa. JAYNE family. (see records for DAVID JAYNE and Polly Berry Jayne, my gr-gr-grandparents.)

From the letters of B.G. Jayne, it appears that he had collected a great deal of history from wills, Bibles, old documents of various types. These letters cover a period from 1800 to 1907-1918, during which time he often mentioned that he had them about ready to publish. But with so many old photographs and documents to be reproduced, the cost ran high even at that time, and evidently he, at the last, did not have sufficient funds to bring out the record in the manner and perfection in which he desired it to be done.

His niece, Mrs. Harriet Underwood Johnston of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, said in one of her letters that "Uncle Ben (B.G.) Jayne came to the home of his sister, Mrs. Underwood, when he was old, feeble and ill" where he died on the 29th of Dec. 1921. He was born May 26, 1831 and mar. Florence Palmer in 1866. He is buried in Lone Tree, Iowa, where other members of the family are buried.

His name was Benaiah Gustin Jayne, grandson of John Jayne and Cornelia Decker Jayne.

Harriet Underwood Johnston, his niece, wrote me that he had all his records with him and that after he died, her sister sent them to his only daughter, Mrs. Florence Jayne Gates (Mrs. Quincy Adams).

In one of the letters I received from Mrs. Gates she said "that she was too old to think of publishing them and as far as I know, she would be the last one to have them, unless she gave them to her children of whom she had six. Mrs. Gates had mentioned in one of her letters that "her grandsons, Stephen and Edmund Gates, would have their record notarized and accurate for them."

Mrs. Gates died in 1952 or 1953 and was buried at Hale Eddy. Where that is, I do not know, but Mrs. Gates resided in Washington D.C. during her later years and did a great deal of work for the Daughters of the American Revolution, making out applications for membership. In one letter she mentioned that her father's

records were in a fire-proof vault. (L.J.D.)

Letter from B.G.(Bensiah) Jayne who was compiling the History of the JAYNE family of Long Island from the emigrant William de Jeanne 1668 and Annie Eggs

The following are copies of letters written to Mrs. John Dull (who was Mary Evalina Jayne, better known as M.Eva Jayne, the eldest daughter of Porter Jayne of Wyoming Co., Pa.) while she lived near Leland, Iowa, Winnebago Co. in 1903.

Dear Cousin,

April 16, 1903

I have been getting the data for a family record and a history of the JAYNE family from the origin of the name "JAYNE".

William de Jeanne was a chaplain in Cromwell's Army, when in 1660, Chas. the 2nd was restored to the throne. William sought safety in flight and to hide his identity, he assumed the name of JAYNE. Coming to America, he landed at New Haven, Conn. and there married Annie Eggs (Begg) in 1673. With ten others, he crossed the Sound to Long Island and settled at the head of Setauket Bay, 52 miles east of New York City. He there raised a family of eight children. The family were still on Long Island and in Orange Co., N.Y. and Northampton Co., Pa. when the American Revolution came. His descendants of the third and fourth generations were then on the active stage.

Captain Timothy JAYNE and my grandfather, Hohn JAYNE, were brothers. Timothy born in 1741 and John in 1749. They were both on the old Homestead on Long Island, but went with their father, William JAYNE (3) to Northampton Co., Pa. There the sons of Captain Timothy JAYNE, David, William and John, who settled in what is now Wyoming Co., Pa., were born and there my father was born. He was the son of John Jayne, the brother of Captain Timothy Jayne.

Your gr-grandfather, David Jayne, lived in Tunkhannock Township in 1848. He was then 8- years of age (approximate birth date 1768). I obtained your grandfather's Timothy Jayne record and that of his brothers and sisters some 20 years ago. I am now trying to bring the records down to date and hope to have them completed this year, when they will be put in print. Much of the preliminary work is now being done, such as making the plates for reproducing some rare old documents, some of the 17th cen. I want your father's record and that of each of his children who have families.

I am indebted to Prof. David A Jayne, your Uncle David Jayne's youngest son, for your address. I wrote your brother, Prof. J.M.(John Marklin) Jayne, but have no response, probably mis-directed. I enclose a blank for your father's record to be filled out.

Please, let me hear from you soon. Your cousin, Prof. David A.

Jayne, is finishing the records of your father's brothers and sisters.

I come to the state of Iowa nearly every year to attend a family reunion of my father's family. I have two brothers and two sisters in Johnson Co., Iowa, and two brothers in Nebraska. Our average age is over 75 years, my oldest brother being nearly 84. With kindly regards to all of the blood and kin.

Dear Cousin,

Yours containing your father's and your family record came this morning.

Now in answer to your letter. All "JAYNES" are cousins. Your grand-grandfather, David Jayne, was a first cousin to my father. I went with my father to visit him in 1848. He lived then in Tunkhannock Township. David Jayne was then 80 years old. My father was born on the adjoining place to David, in Middle Smithfield, Monroe Co. Pa. Their fathers, Captain Timothy Jayne and John Jayne were brothers. They were both born on the old Jayne homestead on Long Island, where their grand-grandfather settled in 1670. By the way, the inscription upon the tombstone of the first man by the name of Jayne is perfectly legible to this day. It reads "Here lies ye body of William Jayne, born at Bristol, England, Jan. 25, 1618. Deceased March ye 24th, 1714. Aged 96 years."

My brothers, John W. and Justus F. live at Lone Tree, Iowa, on the Muscaton and Western R.R. and my sisters are Kate Jayne Underwood and Emily Jayne Robinson live in the same place. John W. is in his 84th year. Justus is 74. I am 72 and the youngest of 5 brothers living.

There are lots of Jaynes in Iowa. John and David Jayne live in Iowa City, Iowa. Their grandfather, Elder Ebenezer Jayne, was a brother to Captain Timothy Jayne and my grandfather, John Jayne. Ebenezer was the Ensign of Captain Timothy Jayne in the Revolution. William E. Jayne at Independence, Iowa, is a grandson of Elder David Jayne, another brother of Captain Timothy and John Jayne of the Revolution. Jacob L. Jayne of Brownsboro, Iowa, is a grandson of Lieut. Isaac Jayne, another brother of Captain Timothy Jayne. Our name, JAYNE, has no Dutch in it. It is Puritan pure and simple. I hope to be able to come to Iowa this fall. If I do, there will be a gathering of the clan as there always is, if I come. Lone Tree is 16 miles S.E. of Iowa City. If I come I will let you know and you come down. All Jayne latch strings are on the outside.

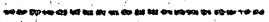

My dear Sir:

Your esteemed favor without date I found on my return from a family gathering in Iowa. Caroline Jayne Rose was the oldest dau. of Timothy Jayne the oldest brother of the late Dr. David Jayne of Philadelphia and the oldest grandchild of Rev. Ebenezer Jayne a noted Baptist Elder of his day. Rev. Ebenezer Jayne was an Ensign in the Company of his brother Capt. Timothy Jayne in the War for American Independence. Her, Mrs. Rose's mother, was Leviaha Davenport, a daughter of Cornelius Davenport, another soldier of the Revolution, of some distinction. The Jayne family are descended from William de Jeune born at Bristol, England Jan. 25, 1618 and who became the chaplain of Oliver Cromwell. At the time of the Restoration of Charles II he found safety in disguise and flight, coming to America. He assumed the name "Jayne" to hide his identity and under that name became one of the grantees of a tract of land on Long Island where he raised a family of six sons and 2 daughters. His grandsons and gr-grandsons were on the active stage when the War for American Independence came. Elder Ebenezer Jayne was a gr-grandson and one of six brothers all of whom served as soldiers in that war, five of the six as commissioned officers. I am compiling a family record and history of the family. I am now long past the allotted span of 3 score and ten. My grandfather who served as a Captain in the Revolution was born on the old Homestead on Long Island, and many papers and old records have come down to me.

I am indeed very thankful to you for the interest you have taken in answering my letter. Timothy Jayne, the father of Mrs. Rose, was born and married in Morris Co., but moved to Jeffersonville, Ohio in 1816. I have a complete record of her brothers and sisters and their descendants.

I inclose a Blank such as I use in gathering data for the Jayne record. If Mrs. Rose has a daughter living, she can in all probability give the names and dates of birth of her brothers and sisters-- the names of their husbands and wives, the places and dates of their death and perhaps the dates of their marriages and the P.O. address of any who are living. I have written you thus fully for two reasons.

First to give you the object and purpose of my inquiry and second to show my thorough appreciation of your kindness in answering. Any trouble you may be to getting the dates to fill the blanks, I will gladly compensate you for---although I am giving my time and labor free to a committee who are to furnish the funds for publishing the Jayne Record. Mrs. Rose had a son Geo. Whitfield Rose---I met him in the Army---he died in the soldiers home in Dayton, Ohio. In making your inquiry, please learn if any other of her sons served in the Union Army. I am one of six brothers who served in the War of 61-65. Five of us still living, the eldest 84, the youngest 73-- I have just returned from Iowa where we five and two sisters, still living, met and fought our battles over again. Thanking you again for you interest, I am
